MLA 9 – In-text Citations

- In-text citations let the reader know the precise location(s) of the work that you're citing in your text.
- They are used when you paraphrase or directly quote someone else's idea(s) / work / facts / creation in your own text.
- Citations are not required for well-known quotations, proverbs, or information that is common knowledge.
- In-text citations are enclosed in (), usually at the end of the sentence or paragraph. Period goes after the ().
- Multiple citations for one idea can be grouped together, separated by a ;.

Parenthetical In-Text Citation – the author's name (or source title) is not used in the text

Print Resources: usually, author's last name and page number

author is known

o last name and page number (Montero 37)

author unknown

o title (shortened form if long) and page number ("Curie" 216) – article (Curie 46) – book

Web Resources: use the first item in the Works Cited entry; for most, page numbers are not provided. If paragraph numbers are provided, use "par." or "pars."

author is known

o last name only (Lavallee)

author is unknown

o usually, title ("Canadian Pacific Railway" par. 4)

For both:

more than one author with same last name

o first initial, last name and page number (D. Francis 12)

2 authors

o last names and page number (Daintith and Hammond 83)

multiple authors (3 or more)

o first author's last name et al. and page number (Russell et al. 23)

more than one resource from same author

o author's last name, title (note use of comma) (Lavalee, "Canadian Pacific Railway")

■ article titles are enclosed in ""; book titles are in *italics* ("Curie" 216) — article (*Curie* 46) — book

when a title is to be used, if it is long, it may be shortened

o begin with the word the title is alphabetized with

o use first phrase or word if it's a clear enough link to the citation

Narrative In-Text Citation – the author's name (or source title) is used in the text

the page number(s) are given in the ()

• In focusing on seaweeds, Swiminer argues that these "nutrient dense and health promoting" plants must be part of a more sustainable solution to "repairing ... broken food systems" (173)
