

## Pacing Boards

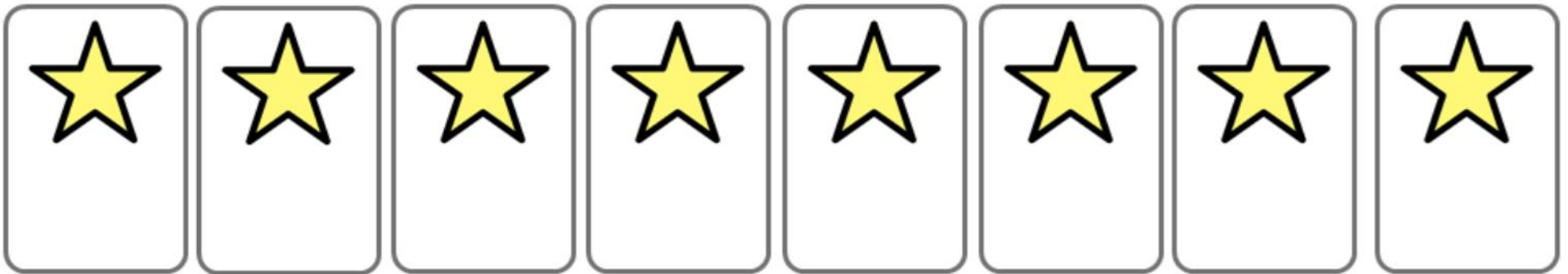
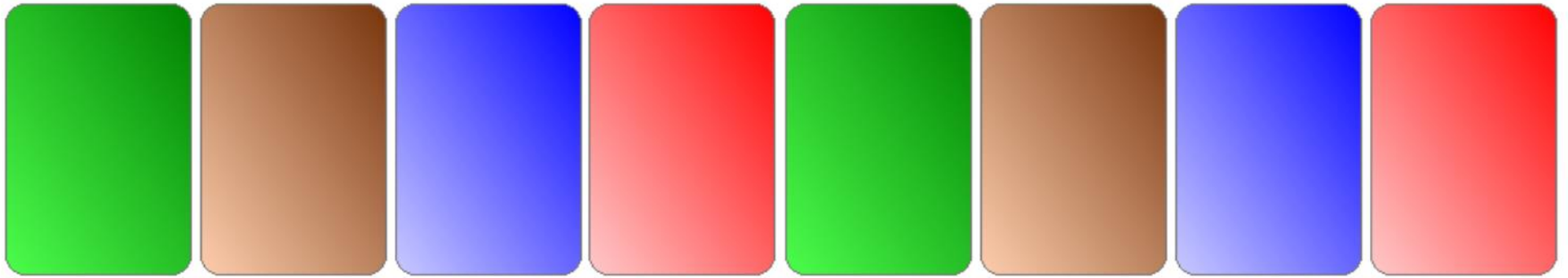
### Instructions:

First print and cut out the board of your choice. Laminate your board or put it in a protective sleeve for durability.

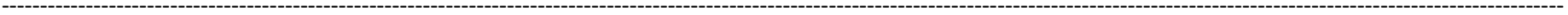
### Pacing boards can be used for:

- Breaking up syllables- Have the student tap out each syllable (one box/ star per syllable) with his/her finger.
- Slowing a sentence utterance down (especially for those real fast talkers or those that have “cluttered” speech) - Have the student tap out each word of his/her utterance (one box/star per word).
- Expanding mean length utterance (sentence length) - provides a visual cue a student to move them from one-word to two-words to three-word utterances and so on.
- Conversational turn taking- helps to provide a child with a visual “my turn/your turn” cue.

\*Always remember to model for your student/ child.



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
